#### Take Root News

Take Root piloted the Community Dinner program in partnership with the First Presbyterian Church in the winter of 2021, serving two dinners cooked in our Cafe kitchen in Pickler's Famous. We served Penne Bolognese and Pulled Pork (the same 'cuban style' as we served in our popular Cuban sandwiches!), serving an average of 65 meals at each dinner.

Based on the success of these dinners, we decided to move ahead with the partnership in 2021. To prepare for this we got the kitchen licensed by the Adair County Health Department for public food service - something that was not difficult at all, thanks to the thoughtful design and construction of the kitchen. From this point on, all our Community Dinners have been prepared, as well as served out of, the Church.

Our 2021 Season wrapped up this November, with a dinner of Braised Beef Short Ribs, served with potatoes & kale or carrots. In keeping with our mission's focus on rebuilding the local food economy as we address food insecurity, the beef was sourced from our longtime supplier, Coleman Farms in Callao, MO. We have been fairly successful over the course of the year in this regard, with close to 70% of the food we serve (by dollar volume) sourced from Missouri farmers.

Over the course of the year, we have provided 654 meals to 244 groups (mostly families). Dinners are distributed for curbside pickup, at no cost, to anyone who shows up. While we can't measure the level of food insecurity among our patrons - meals are provided no questions asked - we do know meals are going to folks that enjoy - and need - them. We average about 25% of meals given out at no cost, and roughly 10% given out below the nominal cost.

Cooking for 80 - our average dinner size - is a lot of fun, and we usually have a good crew of volunteers in the kitchen. We've been serving on Tuesdays, steaming vegetables and unloading roasts from the oven. By mid afternoon, the kitchen smells great, the tent is up, and we are prepared for the controlled chaos of service. Monday is our prep day, spent peeling and chopping and baking - we make all of our breads and desserts from scratch.

Providing scratch-made food from locally sourced ingredients costs a little more - and we believe that in the long run, it is worth it. The value returns to our community in terms of improved health and keeping our food dollars circulating in Adair County.

For 2022, we anticipate restarting service in March. We will be reaching out for volunteers - and donations - as the time approaches. We are grateful to the First Presbyterian Community for hosting us, allowing Take Root to deliver on our mission of to alleviate hunger and promote health by offering nourishing, high quality, local food on a pay-what-you-can basis.
